Junior Warden's report to Christ Church Episcopal Annual Meeting, January 2014

This has been an extraordinarily active year in terms of the maintenance, repair, and upgrading of the parish's physical plant.

The three major building/grounds actions are listed below:

- 1) We began the year with sewage seepage into Griffith's Hall due to a collapsed (determined upon inspection) sewer pipes between the church building and the sewer main in the alley way. Repair could not take place until the spring thaw. Temporary clean up and repair to Griffith's Hall was approved and paid for. In mid-summer the area between Griffith's Hall and Dickey Hall was excavated in order to replace and improve the existing sewer drainage system.
- 2) Due to its age and poor condition, along with damage from water and sewer spills, the Griffith Hall carpet was replaced by the beautiful flooring upon which you now sit. This work took place in late summer.
- 3) In an effort to both beautify our landscaping and offer a place for spiritual reflection and nourishment, the vestry approved the fundraising and construction of our Labyrinth, completed in early fall, in time the diocesan convention.

Additionally, the following maintenance/repair procedures were accomplished:

- 1) Annual furnace/boiler inspection and certification
- 2) Replacement of Columbarium lighting
- 3) Replacement of faulty timer for rear parking lot lighting
- 4) Repair of a number of door hardware systems
- 5) Cleaning of woodwork of sanctuary ceiling and beams
- 6) Semi-annual landscape maintenance by parish members during work days

Many of these projects were accomplished through the selfless donation of parish members' time and energy. Thanks be to God for the blessing of so many skilled, dedicated and giving individuals!

MUSIC Report

Our music program in 2013 was awesome! The choir grew, and worked exceptionally hard this year. Their efforts have produced excellent, beautiful music which the congregation has enjoyed.

Under the expert leadership of David Klassy, a wide variety of music was sung, and the music program grew. The year 2013 showed great growth in energy in our music program, and a significant expansion of the repertoire.

The Red Door Bells handbell choir, which Mr. Klassy developed and led, also added a new dimension to the joyful sound of music in our worship. In addition, it brought some parishioners into the ministry of music who had not participated in it previously.

Both the choir and handbell choir also sang and played beautifully for the Diocesan Convention in October.

Special Easter and Christmas choirs with an enlarged choir including friends of choir members offered beautiful selections that richly enhanced our worship on those occasions.

Mr. Klassy also worked hard at finding and obtaining free music online for the choir's anthems, an effort that saved the church a considerable amount of money, while broadening the range of music offered at Christ Church.

Mr. Klassy devoted many, many hours to the position of Music Director, far above and beyond what one would expect from a volunteer music director.

Sadly, he resigned in November, in part because he felt he could no longer afford to offer his time and effort as a volunteer, although he stayed through Christmas.

We have also enjoyed guitar music offered by Tom Carlson and Mark David, Camas Carlson and Katie Klassy. They bring in the flavor of Camp Marshall, near and dear to the hearts of many.

Music is a very, very important part of worship. As someone famous once said, "those who sing, pray twice." It is also important that we utilize the gifts of our musicians. Our choir, though not large, is one other churches can envy. Many of our

Musicians are very highly skilled and bring amazingly rich and deep experience with them. Their offerings are treasures, indeed.

In addition, a strong music program is vital for congregational growth. The excellence of the 2013 program is certainly a factor in the growth we have seen over the last year.

At this point, we are in need of both a music director and an accompanist. Julie Crandell, who served faithfully and beautifully as Christ Church's Music Director for 15 years, and who, of her own volition, stepped aside to allow Mr. Klassy the opportunity to lead, does not wish to step back into either the role of accompanist or director role; she is enjoying her freedom! Craig Hodges, who directs the Crown of the Continent Choir, directed church choirs for 30 years, and also does not wish to step back into that role. He has, however, graciously agreed to lead the choir for Easter Sunday.

Tom Carlson and Mark David, and anyone else interested in joining them, will offer more guitar Sundays, which will help us. Some have offered to sing as duets, ensembles, etc.

The choir and Joan have met to discuss options, and will continue to explore and discern the path forward for our music program.

Vestry is discussing whether there is a way it can help the situation. The fact remains that we are in need of both an accompanist and a music director.

We have the ingredients for beautiful music to enrich our worship, and we can trust that God will provide the leadership we need.

Please take the time and effort to thank all of our musicians: Julie Crandell, Colby Wood, Julie Pierottet, Barbara Alsbury, Neil and Jeanne Grace, David Reese, Jessica Cooper, Roger Blair, Craig Hodges, Tom Carlson, and Mark David.

Thanks also to Jaimie Jung who played trumpet solos' for us in November and December, and to others who have soloed through the year.

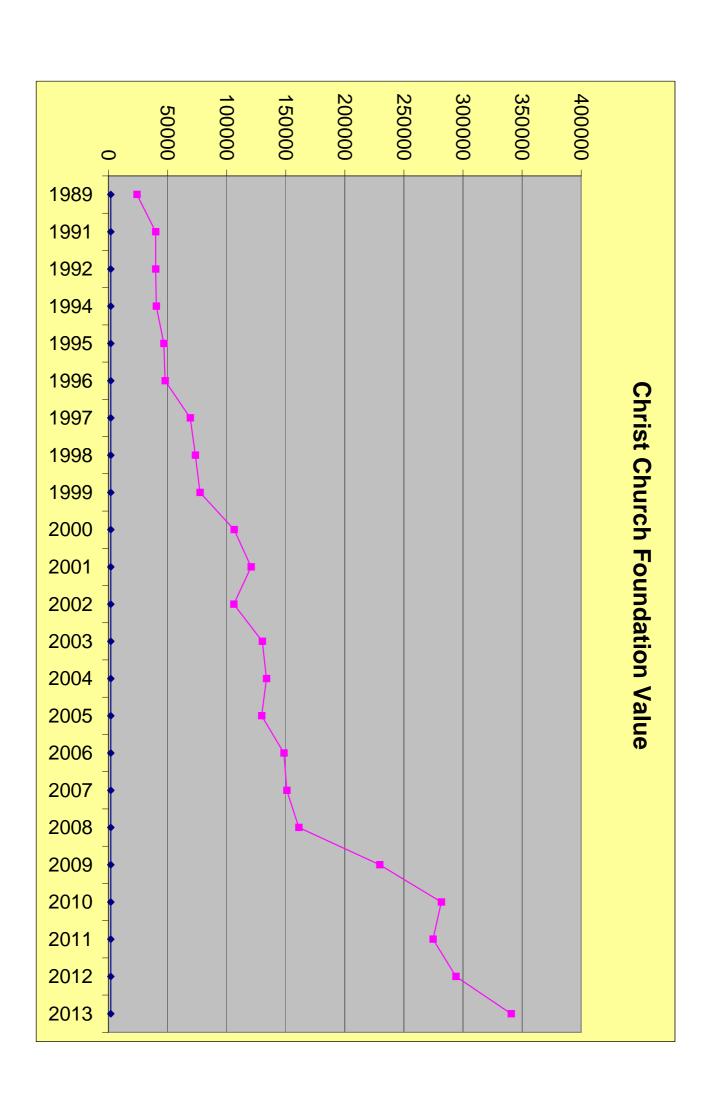
CHRIST CHURCH YOUTH GROUP 2013

Christ Church Annual Foundation Report 2013

The Christ Church Foundation was founded in 1982 to manage and disperse money specifically given to the foundation. Since that date the foundation has invested donations primarily in dividend/interest paying stocks, bonds, certificates of deposit and mutual funds, and has returned the earned income from these investments to Christ Church.

On December 31st 2013 the foundation funds had a valuation of \$340,769. Last year that figure was \$294,010. That is a 15.9% increase over the previous year. Much of this is attributed to the ubiquitous stock market and an \$8,458 long term gain by selling & buying stock this year. To date the oldest records of the fund I have found had the December 31st 1989 valuation at \$24,141 with \$1,923 in dividend earnings going to the parish that year. In 1999 it was valued at \$77,538 with \$6,091 going to the parish. This year (2014) it is projected to provide about \$17,000. See attached chart showing the fund valuation growth over the years.

I would like to emphasis how important it is for members of this parish to remember this fund when compiling their will or if they might need to make a donation for tax purposes. This funds dividends help to pay a portion of the church's operating expenses. It directly provides money every month to help pay the bills. By giving to the foundation fund you are providing a long term way to benefit the future of this parish.

Minutes of the Foundation Fund meetings (generally quarterly) and statements are available for your review. The foundation officers felt it wise to merely watch the market a better part of this year. The foundation has its own web page now (located under the "Resources" tab from the main web page) and we're working on the ability to take contributions on-line. If anyone would like to review the paperwork just let me know and I can make it available.

Current officers of the Christ Church Foundation are: Greg Scarff President, Jon Olson Vice President, Kris Carlson Secretary, and Julie Pierrottet ex officio (Our Senior Warden).

Financial Report 2013

It was a busy year at Christ Church Episcopal.

In preparation for hosting the Diocesan convention, many long neglected maintenance and upkeep projects where completed throughout the church. From dusting the rafters to cleaning out the cupboards, Christ Church is looking better than ever. The floor in Griffins hall was replaced with an easy maintenance and beautiful product that will last for many years. The bathroom backup problem was finally completely addresses with the replacement of sewer pipes in the alley. In total \$3,454 was given for the flooring and \$16,983 was spent from the building fund to complete all of these projects.

The Convention itself was very successful. We hosted 160 delegates and guests from around the state for 3 days at the Hilton with total expenses of \$14,436.80. This was paid for with delegates' fees and seed money from the Diocese. Offerings taken during the convention raised \$1,158 for Camp Marshall, \$1,118 for ERD and \$802.43 for UTO. The silent auction was very successful due to the generousness of your donated items and raised \$6,758 for Camp Marshall.

At the conclusion of convention, the Bishop was able to bless our newly created labyrinth. The project has been in the planning for many years, and it was a great joy to see it completed. The total project cost \$11,518.71 and was funded 100% percent with donations from parishioners. It is a beautiful and holy addition to our grounds, and greatly improves the view from the church office window.

While we fell short of breaking even this year, we continue to get closer to that goal. The finance committee worked hard on the budget for 2014 to continue to address the difference while also adding new areas of funding and emphasis. We are using this process with the Vestry to not only look at what we need to keep the lights on but to also establish goals and priorities as we continue to grow and enrich our congregation. We have added line items for a music director stipend and materials for Godly play as well as for new sources of income from a large fundraiser.

For 2014 we have 31 pledges so far and were delighted to have 10 new pledges. When this was balanced against the 5 who did not renew their pledge this year there was an increase of \$945 with \$85,569 in total pledges. The numbers in the balance sheet and budget do not reflect the generosity and good work of Christ Church members. You have given \$4,500 to Barb Baumgarten to support her mission work in Brazil and \$684 to Episcopal Relief & Development. Camp Marshall received \$1833 through scholarships and donations and the adopted family received \$105 for Christmas dinner. The Red Door Pantry has continued to feed many desperate people and spent \$4,536 this year completely through donations. A line item of \$750 has been added to the church's budget to partially fund this effort but it will continue to rely fully on your support.

If you would like to contribute to these, or any of the special accounts, just mark your intentions in the memo line of your gift. One hundred percent of all designated gifts go to the fund in which it was intended and can only be used for that purpose.

The accompanying financial overview gives the ending balances of our bank accounts and allocation of funds in the special accounts. Our total operating expenses were in the red for 2013 with expenses exceeding income by \$3,426.06 and the General Operating Fund Balance decreased to \$1,962.42. The restricted expenses exceeded income by \$21,406, and when accounting for liabilities, our total assets decreased by \$29,001.
